Casa Cuentos: Nisa's Story

Nisa Brown's family has a unique connection to Casa Esperanza. As you enter the dining room at Casa you will see a framed portrait of Nisa's sister, Vanessa, on the wall to your right. Vanessa battled cancer in 1984 and would often talk about seeing lots of kids her age from around the state sleeping in their cars as they also underwent treatment at UNMH. She couldn't believe how many people she saw without a place to stay while seeking treatment in Albuquerque. Unfortunately Vanessa passed away in 1986, five days after her 19th birthday, but her friends were ready to begin making Vanessa's dream a reality.



The mother of a close friend of Vanessa's approached the board of realtors and was relentless in her pursuit of realizing Vanessa's dream. 6 years later Casa Esperanza was ready to open our doors and Nisa and her family have been involved since the groundbreaking.

Nisa has been a donor for over 15 years and would often come cook dinners with her coworkers while she worked at Sandia Labs. She was also active in promoting Casa Esperanza at Sandia Labs when there were United Way campaigns, and would often help organize volunteer groups to come volunteer at Casa.

Nisa and her husband both retired from Sandia labs in the past few years, and have been enjoying the retired life. Nisa loves hiking and scrapbooking in her free time, and both enjoy spending time travelling to southern Colorado. Nisa has had to take a step back from being as active as she likes at Casa Esperanza, but hopes soon she can begin volunteering again with her whole family. "Casa Esperanza is the place I want to spend my time and money, it is my place!"

Lindsay's Story

Lindsay Nelson is the friendliest most welcoming human that anyone will find staying at Casa Esperanza. With a smile and a helping hand, the families can always rely on her for help or an ear to lend.

Although her spirit is always up and her smile is endless, Lindsay has recently fallen on hard times. Officially, Lindsay's diagnosis was Stage 3 Breast Cancer that spread into her lymph nodes. Her doctors recommended an aggressive treatment of chemotherapy, radiation and surgery. During that time, Lindsay lost her strength, which led her to lose her 25-year career as a Chef. A career she had worked diligently to learn.



Lindsay finished her last chemotherapy treatment on March 27, 2024. Two days later, the person she was staying with told her she had to leave. Because of previous circumstances and the loss of her job, Lindsay was now homeless and still dealing with the effects of her treatment. Lindsay's mother offered for her to come to Arizona to stay with her, but her ongoing treatment meant she had to stay in New Mexico.

Since April, Lindsay has stayed at Casa Esperanza and has been a beacon of hope to the families and staff, even planning a birthday party for one of her fellow residents. She has expressed her excitement at the prospect of starting a whole new career when she finishes treatment. In all the trials she had gone through in the past year she mentioned, "I could have lost hope, but because I ended up here, I didn't. My hope was reinforced."
